Pentecost: Feel the Spirit!

This is our second issue published on a seasonal cycle. That being said, "Pentecost-Trinity" is not a "season," but an 8-day period in the Church's calendar. The "season" which follows is not the "Pentecost season" but rather the season "after Pentecost". I will discuss that further in the next issue.

The Day of Pentecost is the Fiftieth Day -- the final day of the Great Fifty Days of Easter. The Church remembers through its lessons that the disciples gathered in a room (the "upper room"??) and heard "something like the rush of wind" and saw "something like tongues of fire" both of which were interpreted as the outpouring of the Holy Spirit which had been promised by the Risen (and now ascended) Jesus. Pentecost is called "the birthday of the Church" because the manifestation was not limited to the disciples, but was shared with the general populace. Pilgrims in Jerusalem for the Jewish religious feast being celebrated all understood each other -- sort of the Tower of Babel story in reverse. The Church spread because Pentecost proved that "we are one in the Spirit".

Pentecost is also one of the Church's baptismal days. If we do not baptize on this day, we renew our baptismal promises. The color of this day (and on every celebration of the Holy Spirit (such as confirmations, ordinations, etc.) is red. It is the end of the great celebration which began with the Great Vigil of Easter. The paschal candle burns one last time on this day. The kneelers get returned to their normal places after the services. We say "Alleluia. Alleluia" one last time. Life now returns to Ordinary Time.

Trinity Sunday (May 18) is the First Sunday after Pentecost. It is the celebration of a doctrine, not of a person or an event. It is the celebration that we know God as Father, Son and Holy Spirit -- Creator, Redeemer and Sanctifier. It recognizes that throughout history our Creator had been manifested to the Creation in a number of ways. The special color of this day is White (as is Christmas, Easter, and other feasts of the Lord. We have felt God walk in the Garden with Adam and Eve, have heard his voice as he preached and taught on the shores of the Sea of Galilee, and have felt the movement of the Spirit at Pentecost. It is the celebration of the community of God and of communion with God.

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CANON JIM'S JOTTINGS

As I write this note, I am in Richmond, Virginia for a conference called CREDO 2. I went to a CREDO conference six years ago. This is a follow-up conference for clergy who are 55 or over. It is designed to bring a group of 30-35 clergy together for a week to reflect on their vocations, health, spirituality, finances, and relationships.

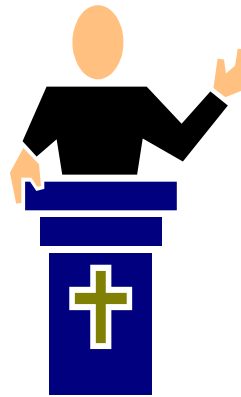
One of the reasons that the Church Pension Fund created CREDO ten years ago was that many clergy were suffering from perpetual burn-out, had little or no support systems, had no idea of how to get into a position of health, and had no plans for the future except to set their alarms for the next morning.

My week has been one of relaxation, refreshment, reinvigoration and renewal. We have spent a week at Roslyn, the beautiful conference center of the Diocese of Virginia. The team leaders include the Canon Theologian of the Diocese of Los Angeles and the recently retired Dean of Virginia Seminary.

The goal of the week is that each attendee develop three goals based on the talks and workshops as well as the resources they have brought with them. Some of you recently filled out an online questionnaire that was part of this process.

As you know, this summer I will reach the point that I could retire (based on my 30 years of ordained service to the Church). One of my learnings is that I feel called to "re-up" (as they say in the military) for the next period of my ministry. That could be for anywhere from 2 - 8 years, so don't buy the stamps for the next Rector search process yet (unless they're the "always" stamps).

Now, I have to work on my goals. Some of those relate to the parish, some to my household, and some to my relationship with God. They have to do with three areas (which I entitled my



"three clouds of unknowing") -- finances, health and clutter. Some of you may shout "Alleluia." Before you do that, however, know that I need your help.

All of these areas have an impact on my Parish life, my home life and my spiritual life. It is not, "that's nice, how will you do that?", rather it is "what is the road that we together will walk?" It calls for more discipline and dedication from me and for your patience, understanding and, where appropriate, your participation. We are, after all, part of a community of faith.

This conference is worth the \$500 that the parish invested in its cost. Most of the expense is borne by the Church Pension Fund and a bit from me. I will be sharing more with you in the weeks and month to come, but I wanted to let you know my feelings at this point.

As you read this on or after Pentecost (May 11), I will have just returned from a week in Hawaii helping my sister and her family. Mary has just begun a regimen of chemotherapy due to the ovarian cancer that was detected in April. Thankfully, it appears that it was quite limited in its spread and that no other areas were affected by the cancer. That is a blessing! I appreciate your support and prayers. Based on this visit and what it seems her schedule of treatments seems to be, I will decide about further trips to Kauai this summer. I am thankful for your prayers, gifts (for Mary), and thoughts.

Once in a Decade: The Lambeth Conference

From July 16 to August 4, over 880 bishops from Anglican churches all over the world are meeting at the University of Kent in England. Named after the residence of the Archbishop of Canterbury, Lambeth Palace, where the conference took place until it outgrew the actually small palace, there have been thirteen conferences to date, with the first being held in 1867.

The Lambeth Conference is a gathering of bishops meeting every ten years under the presidency of the Archbishop of Canterbury to focus on Anglican unity, to discuss issues of common concern, and to study and learn about the faith alive in each of the member churches of the Anglican Communion.

There are more than 77 million members in the Anglican Communion in 38 self-governing Provinces in more than 160 countries. Believing in the wisdom of the local churches, Anglicanism is not governed by a central authority, and so the Lambeth Conference has no legislative rights or privileges.
