Episcopal General Convention— Anaheim, July 8-17

Modeled after the structure of the U. S. Congress, the House of Deputies (clergy & lay) and the House of Bishops will look at issues facing Church and society in the 21st century. Some of the major issues that will be dealt include:

**Unity & Tensions within the Anglican Communion over Biblical Authority & Interpretation

***Proposed inter-Communion with the United Methodist Church and the Moravian Church

**Proposed Canon Law regarding Church Discipline and the Laity

**Ethical responses to issues of war, torture & terrorism

***New & revised liturgies -- especially adding many notable persons to the Church's Calendar of Commemorations

Visitors may attend the Episcopal Church's 76th General Convention by purchasing a \$15 day pass. (A pass good for the entire meeting is \$50.

On Sunday, July 12, all are welcome to attend the General Convention Eucharist and UTO Ingathering. Presiding Bishop Katharine Jefferts Schori will preside.

No pass or fee is required for that day, and the Exhibit Hall, with its many vendors and informational booths, will be open to all after the Eucharist.

CANON JIM'S JOTTINGS

The "Great Fifty Days of Easter" ended with the glorious celebrations on Pentecost. We all wore red, celebrated with Eugenie & Ryan in their baptisms, attended the beautiful choral evensong, were thrilled by John Thomas's recital of the music of Claude Debussy, and were filled with the marvelous "red food event"!!!! Who can ask for anything more?

The kneelers are now in place, the Paschal Candle is back by the Baptismal Font, and the color will be green for most of the time until Advent -- the last Sunday in November. The Season AFTER Pentecost -- so-called "Ordinary Time" -- is a period during which we learn about the faith of the Church and the ministry of Jesus. This year, we will hear the saga of Israel from Saul & David through Job and Ruth; we will hear readings from the Epistles of 2 Corinthians, Ephesians, James and the Book of Hebrews; and will hear the story of Jesus ministry as recorded in Chapters 4-13 of Mark's Gospel along with five weeks from Chapter 6 of John's Gospel. On the Day after Independence Day, we shall commemorate the 233rd anniversary of American Independence.

Church School will end on June 21 with a presentation by the children in the 10 a.m. service. Periodically in the summer, we shall present shorter sermons directed to parishioners of ALL ages -- especially the younger ones. In August and early September, Mthr. Vicki will lead the children in several special Sunday experiences. She will be writing about that elsewhere.

Summer is not a time for rest here -- just a re-focusing for the three months until Homecoming Sunday on September 27. This year, Bishop Chester Talton will be with us on that day and we look forward to his visit. I will write more about that in the next issue of *The Quill*.

TRAVELS & DISTRACTIONS

As usual, I will be away in early June to visit friends in Seattle and then to join friends in Ashland, OR at the Oregon Shakespeare Festival. In late June and early July, I will attend some of the meetings of the Association of Anglican Musicians here in Los Angeles. The current President was our Music Director at All Saints, Northfield, MN in the mid-1980's. In mid-July, I will be attending the General Convention of the Episcopal Church, meeting this year in Anaheim (more on that elsewhere in this article). In August, I will be on vacation during the first half of the month in Arizona, New Mexico & Texas.

In mid-August, Mthr. Vicki will be presenting a look at her travel to the Holy Land. It is tentatively scheduled for Wednesday evening, August 19, and at a daytime event yet to be scheduled.



THE 76th GENERAL CONVENTION

I have often said that the General Convention is (in equal thirds) work, alumni meeting & state fair. This time, I will be working with The Consultation -- a group of social justice ministries within the Episcopal Church. I will be helping them track legislation and make connections with necessary deputies and Bishops. In other words, I will be a lobbyist.

The Church will have bulletin inserts through the end of the General Convention to talk about what is happening. You may also follow the work of the General Convention at www.episcopalchurch.org/cons/

Furthermore, I will report on the General Convention in my sermon on Sunday, July 19. In late July, I will put out a display of all of the materials from the various Episcopal & Anglican groups represented at the convention (even those with which I disagree).

We are currently looking at chartering a bus to Anaheim on Sunday, July 12 for the great service on that day and I will report to you about those plans later in July. Both services at St. Bede's that day will be Morning Prayer.

Incidentally, Fr. Holger Laske, our assistant in 1997-1999, had hoped to join us from Germany for the General Convention. Unfortunately, he will not be able to do that. We will miss his presence and hope to see him in the near future!

FALL RETREAT IN SANTA BARBARA

The annual retreat with the Holy Cross brothers is scheduled for the weekend of November 13-15. This will be our first opportunity to be with them since the devastating fire last November. The retreat will be held at St. Mary's Convent which is next to the Santa Barbara Mission. The cost of the retreat is \$200. Please sign up in the narthex by the end of August. ADOPTING A PLOT - PART TWO

I am repeating this from the last issue as we are still developing the plans. In the summer, we are going to produce a map of the property which will be divided up in a way that will encourage parishioners to adopt a section to weed and keep in shape. This work may be done at any time, not just the announced work-days. This is not a new idea. The late Don Thomas maintained a section of the planter at the bottom of the steps leading to the parking lot. We need to get the work days to focus on the "big-ticket items" and not the general maintenance. We have also been challenged to grow vegetables in some of the less well tended (currently) planters. Again, we will be keeping you up-to-date on these plans.

BUILDINGS & EVALUATIONS

In the late summer, we shall send out materials to every household about plans for the long-discussed building which would house the offices and the rooms needed for Christian Education. We will have a series of meetings in mid-September to answer questions and receive input relating to the development of the plan. While there are no plans to build anything in the next several years, the Vestry and I feel that it would be wise to do our homework now.

Also, we will participate in the second stage of the Natural Church Development process in October. Many of you were involved either in taking the inventory (limited to 30 people plus the pastor) and/or in discussing the results. Now, we see how our prayers, study and discussions have borne fruit. Again, there will be more information in the next issue of *The Quill*.

Oberammergau- Passion Play Update

Last year, Fr. Jim announced the 2010 trip to the Passion Play in Oberammergau, Germany, which occurs every ten years. The trip now has 42 people signed up with room for only 8 more people. Anyone interested should talk to Fr. Jim as soon as possible.

Imagine a promise kept for almost four centuries! In 1633, the Black Plague was sweeping across Europe. The devout people of Oberammergau pledged that if God would spare them, they would present a day-long play depicting the last week in Jesus' life. They have presented a passion play every decade since their salvation. It now takes place on a magnificent open-air stage with a covered auditorium that seats 4,700 people.

The 2010 Passion Play in Oberammergau, Germany, is the centerpiece of a twelve-day trip to the heart of Europe. Departing Los Angeles on August 24, the trip goes to Berlin, Dresden, Munich, Neuschwanstein (Ludwig's castle), Heidelberg & the Rhine Valley (Germany), Prague (Czech Republic), Lake Lucerne & the Swiss Alps (Switzerland). These are lands touched by the reformations of the 17th century which have shaped our faith and life. Berlin, once a symbol of division, now sparkles as it is finally rebuilt from the ashes of World War 2 and the years of division by the Berlin Wall.

The cost for this trip is \$4,299 from Los Angeles. Brochures are available in the Narthex or on the website (www.stbedesla.org).
